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(ETHICS, INTEGRITY AND APTITUDE PART-2)

GROUP A

Q.1 Answer:

APPROACH:

- Introduction: Define ethical challenges in governance and private institutions, emphasizing accountability and transparency.
- Body: Compare government vs. private institutions in terms of ethical dilemmas, causes (bureaucracy, profit motives), and consequences.
- Conclusion: Advocate balanced regulations and ethical frameworks to ensure integrity in both sectors.

Introduction:

Ethical issues occur when a given decision, scenario, or activity creates a conflict with society's moral principles. It is about making the right choices for ethical reasons. Since decision-making is involved in both private and public institutions, both face a diverse set of ethical issues. It is observed that the ethical decision-making models of both institutions differ.

Body:

- Decision-making: Decisions in the private sector are simply based upon profit-making. Therefore,
 the ethical issues generally revolve around achieving economic objectives within the rules set by
 regulatory authorities. However, decision-makers in public sectors have to be selfless since they
 have to achieve social objectives rather than profit.
 - o **Therefore, they face multiple ethical issues** e.g., during allocation of resources, targeting beneficiaries, implementation of policies, etc.
- **Desirability/Value judgment**: The functioning of the private sector, in many cases, is short-sighted. Their activities depend upon fulfilling existing demand and making a profit out of it. Their approach does not involve normative judgments e.g., the private sector frequently indulges in selling tobacco, alcohol, junk food, pornography, prostitution, etc.
 - o **The public sector, however, has to apply a normative approach** and resolve ethical issues surrounding social benefits, intergenerational equity, environmental concerns, etc.
- **Discretionary aspect:** Public officials are subjected to a higher degree of scrutiny and are prone to criticisms by some sections of the public even when they exercise their discretionary powers keeping in conformity with **all prescribed rules**, **regulations**, **and procedures**.
 - o **Private professionals need not worry about such external criticisms** as they are subjected to relatively less public scrutiny and are majorly accountable to the owners of the organization.
- Questionable practices: Private sectors are often associated with questionable business practices.
 Ethical issues arise especially at places where regulations are not very clear such as activities associated with exploitation of natural resources, treatment of employees, handling business secrets, lobbying, etc. In order to compete with others, several questionable business tactics are also adopted by them.
- One can observe nepotism, whimsical hiring and firing, and opaque working styles in the Private sector. However, such issues in the public sector may lead to greater negative consequences if the issues get exposed, thereby acting as a deterrent against such questionable practices.

Conclusion:

However, both sectors also face several common ethical issues such as harassment and discrimination at the workplace especially that of women employees, issues surrounding governance, maintaining secrecy, and data privacy, etc. but the magnitude of these issues differ drastically.

Introduction:

Moral norms are generally accepted social practices that guide human behavior and function as mainly informal guidelines in a particular group or community about right and wrong social conduct. Whereas, the law is a structured system of rules and regulations enforced through authorities to govern an individual's behavior, actions, and social relations. Laws and moral norms are intimately related to each other.

Body:

Moral principles and norms of society form the base for enacting laws. It is often argued that laws need

to be consistent with prevalent moral norms as:

Although law and moral norms are interdependent, law may be at variance with moral norms in their content, definiteness, and sanction:

Good laws sometimes serve to rouse the moral conscience of the people and create and maintain such conditions which may encourage the growth of moral norms in the society. The best example is that of the Indian Constitution which when adopted was a new concept but, over time, instilled democratic values, like liberty, and secularism in the society and made it a moral norm for society.

Laws also provide for punishment for their violation. Violation of a legally enforceable action has penal provisions by the competent authority while moral norms do not invite such punishment, making the law more assertive and making it independent also from moral norms.

Moral norms may vary from individual to individual, between communities, and also among regions. However, the law needs to be uniform throughout the country, irrespective of individual choice. For example, homosexuality was widely perceived as unnatural and immoral, but with social progression, section 377 has been declared unconstitutional.



Conclusion:

The relationship between law and moral norms is dynamic and a function of its times. Moral norms guide laws and changing ethical and moral standards leads to amendment or invalidation of existing laws while at the same time, laws also set moral norms in society.

(b) Answer:

Importance of Leadership quality in civil servant:

- Leadership Holders of public office: They should exhibit these principles in their own behaviour. They should actively promote and robustly support the principles and be willing to challenge poor behaviour wherever it occurs.
 - For Example- Senior IAS officer Parameswaran Iyer, secretary to the Union ministry of drinking water and sanitation, got inside a twin toilet pit in a Telangana village and removed faecal matter with his hands. He led by example in showing that scavenging is not a menial job and changed attitude of people toward pit cleaners.
- Selflessness: Holders of public office should act solely in terms of the public interest.

 For Example- Tukaram Omble- During 26/11 terror attack in Mumbai, Omble stood in front of Ajmal Kasab and held on to the barrel of Kasab's rifle, thus preventing the bullets from hitting anyone else



but him. The rest of the team managed to overpower and apprehend Kasab. He took over 40 bullets from an Ak-47 at point blank range and accepted martyrdom.

- **Integrity**: Holders of public office must avoid **placing themselves** under any obligation to people or organisations that might try **inappropriately** to influence them in their work. They should not act or **take decisions** in order to gain financial or other **material benefits** for themselves, their family, or their friends. They must declare and **resolve any interests** and relationships.
 - For Example- TN Seshan was the 10th Chief Election Commissioner of India (1990–96), who reformed elections by largely ending its malpractices in the country and redefined the status and visibility of the Election Commission of India. T.N. Seshan's name has become synonymous with integrity.
- **Objectivity:** Holders of public office must act and take **decisions impartially**, fairly and on merit, using the **best evidence** and without discrimination or bias.
- Accountability: Holders of public office are accountable to the public for their decisions and actions
 and must submit themselves to the scrutiny necessary to ensure this.
- Openness: Holders of public office should act and take decisions in an open and transparent manner.
 Information should not be withheld from the public unless there are clear and lawful reasons for so doing.

Apart from all the qualities mentioned above they also have to deal with the crisis situation such as COVID-19 pandemic. They should take actions urgently for example Tina Dhabi took firm action in Bhilwara district. Leadership should be promoted in civil servants online with Kiran Agarwal committee recommendations.

Conflict of interest is possibly the most obvious example that can place people, especially in the public sector, in an ethical dilemma. **Body:**

Ethical dilemma leading to crisis of conscience:

- Conscience is the ability to determine right from wrong, to decide whether to act with truth or deceit. When a person acts wrongly, the conscience pricks and alerts the person to avoid such an action. This happens in situations, where one finds it difficult to decide the due ethical dilemma.
- Despite this inner alert, if one acts against his/her conscience to meet the demand of the situation then there is a crisis of conscience.

Examples of ethical dilemmas leading to a crisis of conscience:

Public life: Public officials often face ethical dilemmas, sometimes leading to a crisis of conscience. For instance, consider a case where a public official has been ordered to forcefully evict illegal shelters from government land. While studying the case the official finds that the occupants are poor people with no other alternative for their survival.

In such a case, the official faces an ethical dilemma as s/he has to choose between her/his conscience of giving them time to vacate or perform his duty. If s/he performs her/his duty and goes against the interest of poor people without taking into account their concerns, there will be a crisis of conscience.

Public activism: An officer facing the dilemma of providing regular water supply and other infrastructural services to occupants of illegal settlements. The voice of conscience may motivate the officer to provide for basic facilities while the rules may prevent him from doing so. Abiding by the rules and choosing not to provide the facilities may lead to a crisis of conscience.

Example from personal life: I saw a poor child stealing a pencil from a stationary shop without paying for the same. Though I wanted to report this incident to the shopkeeper, I sidelined my voice of conscience, as the child seemed to be poor and needy. Thus, there was an ethical dilemma between two values, i.e., protecting the poor child vs. reporting the act of stealing. Choosing any one of two options may lead to a crisis of conscience.

Conclusion:

From the above, we can say that it is normal to have ethical dilemmas. However, it must be ensured that the voice of conscience gets heard and the person does not make decisions when faced with the crisis of conscience.

To avoid a situation of crisis of conscience, an individual should develop sound moral and ethical judgment, which can help them choose between good and bad. Also, there needs to be a proper legal setup to check any deviation and the wrongdoers ought to be punished.

- <u>Ensures ethical business practices</u>: Many times loopholes exist in the regulatory frameworks, which lead to unethical practices.
 - o For example, the existence of child labor, chemical discharges in water bodies, etc.
 - o **In such cases, it depends upon the company** to decide whether it wants to exploit the loopholes or stick to the right means. Ethics officers ensure that the right means are adopted while making profits.
- <u>Protects the interests of whistle-blowers</u>: An ethics officer ensures that the identities of whistle-blowers are kept completely anonymous. If they are ostracised, bullied, or ignored by their colleagues, the Chief Ethics Officers intervene to put an end to this behavior.
- <u>Strengthens the faith of shareholders</u>: In conjunction with legal counsel, the ethics officers conduct annual corporate governance audits to determine the state of the corporation and present findings to superiors. They also ensure that the code of conduct is being strictly followed by the company.
 - o **E.g., employees are being treated fairly or the corporation** is fulfilling its social responsibilities, etc. This strengthens the faith of shareholders in the corporation.
- <u>Promotes ethical work culture</u>: An ethics officer oversees the development and implementation of
 corporate ethics. It conducts ethical decision-making training for senior management on ethics and
 avoiding conflicts of interest. They provide processes for the confidential hearing of employees and
 promptly conduct investigations on issues related to ethics or conflicts.

Conclusion:

The concept of having an ethics officer was for the first time officially adopted in the USA in 1978. However, in the case of India, ethics officers are still a rarity. Even companies such as Tata Steel, which are known for their value system, do not appoint a separate ethics officer. Their managing director is also the chief ethics officer.

But, this is not a good practice since a **CEO** himself can be under scrutiny at times. The rising cases of unethical practices by corporations such as Vodafone, Ranbaxy Apple, etc. highlight the need for ethics officers to strengthen corporate governance further.

Additionally, EI is increasingly being recognized as a differentiator by organizations as the high cost of **employee turnover**, **demands for higher profitability**, **business transformation**, **etc**. require employees who possess EI competencies and can be flexible as per the demands of the job. Introduction:

The given case study basically presents a man-animal conflict, which escalates due to the negligence of local administration in controlling the population of animals, in this case dogs, beforehand. It also presents a situation where the dog lovers are at loggerheads with the complainants.

Body:

(a) The ethical issues involved in the given case study are:

- Dogs are sentient beings known for their friendly and loyal nature. Culling them mercilessly would be inhuman and unethical.
- The roads are not safe for the children and elderly. This shows that the government is not working efficiently in the public interest.
- The Supreme Court order says, that wherever human lives need protection, the authorities have the right to remove the stray animals and practice euthanasia. This is the responsibility of the state, rather than some group to take law and order into their hands.
- In the absence of quick corrective actions by the administration, vigilante groups come forward. Such groups generally go out of the way and pursue illegal methods to resolve the issues at hand. For instance, rather than euthanizing the animal through sophisticated means, vigilante groups can opt for cruel methods of culling.
- Those who feed stray dogs and are sympathetic toward their situation do not feel responsible
 enough to ensure that the population of such pack animals remains limited, or the animals get
 neutered or vaccinated.
- The situation has created a tension in the society and has led to conflict, which can escalate further.

(b) As a DM of such a district, I would take the following course of action: Short Term:

- I would order a fast inquiry to find out the data related to the number of attacks by the dogs and
 would like to ascertain the actual threat to human lives because of the presence of dogs in the
 streets.
- Vigilante groups that are found to be involved in the practice of culling street dogs enmasse would be prosecuted under the **Prevention of Animal Cruelty Act, 1960.**
- If human lives were indeed in danger because of these dogs, I would order that the stray dogs be caught by the municipality as soon as possible. This would decrease the pack size and remove an immediate threat to human lives.
- The rabid and diseased dogs would be euthanized. The healthy and harmless dogs would be sterilized/neutered.
- If the number of dogs is very high and exceeds the resource capacities of the Animal Welfare Board, the local NGOs will be informed to shoulder some responsibilities.

Long Term:

- I would ask the Animal Birth Control unit to specify the scientific number of street dogs that can live harmoniously with a particular size of human society for different localities of the district.

- **Neglect of moral and value inculcation**: Moral education does not form a significant part of the academic curriculum at the school/college level. Also, the emergence of nuclear families has led to neglect of moral and value teachings within the family.
- **Complex laws and procedures**: It is not easy for a common man to understand laws and procedures. Complicated laws with multiple interpretations often become a source of corruption.

Leaders like Hosni Mubarak, Muammar Qaddafi, etc. were displaced because illegitimacy became the decisive force for change.

- **Responsibility to Protect (R2P):** It is an international norm that seeks to ensure that the international community does not fail to halt the mass atrocity crimes of genocide, war crimes, ethnic cleansing, etc. If a state fails to protect its citizens, it loses legitimacy and there is a need for the global community to intervene.
- Movement on the need to address climate change: Earlier policies of the governments for
 economic growth and development while neglecting the environmental consequences have lost
 legitimacy, especially in the era of climate change.
- Nuclear use taboo: In general, it is an accepted fact that nuclear weapons are means of mass
 destruction and there is a need to engage the major players toward radical reductions in the
 number of nuclear weapons. To further this agenda, the UN General Assembly passed the Treaty
 on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.
- Other efforts by the global community: Serious attention is being given to the improved status of women, global poverty, and the plight of the least well-off, as seen in the aspirations of the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

The principle of civil service anonymity is derived from the Whitehall model that backs the administrative traditions of the **UK**, **Australia**, **New Zealand**, **and Canada**. As per this model, public servants/bureaucrats should be politically neutral and work 'behind the curtains'. They must keep themselves away from being recognized publicly or appreciated for that matter.

This has traditionally been seen as an important arrangement because:

In this context, the doctrine of facelessness refers to a situation in which civil servants are seen to be the servants of the ministers and must act solely by their policies and implement their instructions. They do not have an independent existence and they do not name themselves nor are named in public.

They must not be identified with a particular action whether it is for blame and criticism or praise and approbation. The ministers, as elected representatives of the people and as collectively the apex of the central executive hierarchy in the country, are solely responsible to the Parliament and accountable for the policies and actions of departments, and by consequence of the civil servants, over which they preside.

In recent years, the core principle of civil service anonymity has been dwindling for a variety of reasons. Members of Parliament are seen to be willing to name and blame the civil servants as opposed to accepting responsibility for the actions of their departments. For instance, in the 2G spectrum and coal block allocation cases, it was civil servants who have disproportionately been convicted compared to their political masters.

The inclination of a few Indian civil servants towards one or the other ideology over social media is not desirable. Various top-level bureaucrats who are at the helm of important portfolios (both civil and police) have used their social media handles to violate the cardinal principles of civil service anonymity and neutrality.

Conclusion:

Such incidents raise suspicion in the minds of the general public about the neutrality of civil servants. Thus, the principles of civil service anonymity and neutrality remain important, which should be upheld and observed strictly for better functioning of civil services.

- **Conflicting laws:** In case of conflicting laws, a public servant's own moral prudence and individual morality rather than law serves as a guiding light.
 - For example, the conflict between the sharing of information in the public domain through the RTI Act and restrictions as per the Official Secrets Act leads to the officer using his morality to decide the course of action on a case-by-case basis.

- Role of individual's conscience: At times, an individual's conscience helps as a guide to make ethical decisions.
 - For example, public administrators are involved in corruption cases despite the Prevention of Corruption Act, of 1988.
